INTERSTATE 30 UPDATES

TxDOT's ongoing construction projects in Rockwall continue to bring major roadway improvements, including the widening of the I-30 bridges over John King Blvd. and FM 3549/Stodghill Rd. As part of this work, on-ramp closures and lane shifts are expected through the end of the year. Progress continues on the Horizon Bridge expansion, with traffic now shifting to the new lanes and demolition of the old bridge soon.

Speed limits have been reduced to 35 MPH on all frontage roads in City limits. Residents and drivers should use extra

caution when navigating these lanes and temporary business driveways in the area.

Progress continues on the I-30 eastbound frontage road over the lake, with drilling underway on the westbound side.

The City of Rockwall has confirmed the presence of the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)—'a highly destructive, invasive insect that targets ash trees. The pest was discovered in a natural greenbelt area near John King Blyd and SH 66, thanks to a resident who reported a group of dead trees on July 15, 2025. This small metallic-green beetle, originally from Asia, has spread across the U.S. since the 1990s, killing millions of ash trees. It was first detected in Michigan in 2002 and is now confirmed in Rockwall County by both City staff and the Texas A&M Forest Service. All types of ash trees are susceptible—including White Ash, Green Ash, and Black Ash, with Green Ash being the most common in our great Ash being the most common in our area. What to Look For:

"D"-shaped exit holes in the bark S-shaped tunnels under the bark

Sudden dieback of ash tree branches or entire trees

What Should You Do?

1. Dead Trees in Natural Areas: If an infected tree is in a greenbelt or natural area and does not pose a danger to people or property, it can be left in place.

2. Valuable Landscape Trees: Trees in yards, parks, or public areas may benefit from treatment if still healthy. The most effective method is injection with emamectin benzoate, which must be done by a Certified Arborist.


3. Older Ash Trees: Many Arizona Ash trees planted in the 1970s–80s are nearing the end of théir lifespan. If impacted by EAB, removal is likely the best option.

If you suspect your tree is affected, contact an ISA Certified Arborist for inspection and treatment options.

Fun Fact: The Emerald Ash Borer is the only insect that leaves behind a D-shaped hole when it exits the tree!
